Message from the Academic Director

BLUEPRINT UPDATE

Heather Main, former principal of BBMH in conjunction with members of the MIND - Montessori In Delta Society produced our BLUEPRINT. This document is based upon a model produced by Tim Seldin, President of The Montessori Foundation, who states “The most effective schools consistently show a strong commitment to an on-

going process of self-study that involves not only the faculty and administration, but parents and students as well. He suggests the blueprint cycle takes about three years and is accomplished in a series of stages. The first step is to define a simple, one sentence mission that summarizes the basic reasons for the schools existence and its special

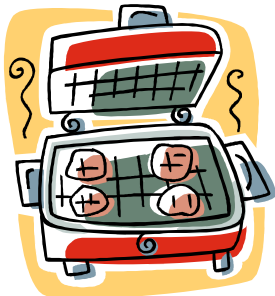
keeping and connect with one another on a school-wide basis, in an atmosphere of trust and inclusion, enjoying food and cooperative games. Look for further details in the class handouts!

Choir with Natasha Neufeld, Natasha holds a Bachelor of Music and Bachelor of Education

from U.B.C. Her most recent studies were in Salzburg, Austria at the Mozarteum University, in the vocal pedagogy program. She has played in various instrumental and choral groups, including the Vancouver Youth Symphony, Vancouver Philharmonic Orchestra, UBC Symphony Orchestra, UBC Chamber Choir and University Singers, and the Salzburg Bach Choir. Boundary Bay Montessori House is an independent Montessori school registered and classified as a Group I school (Preschool to Grade 7) under the British Columbia Ministry of Education. BBMH opened its Elementary program in 1990.

BBMH is administered by the Montessori in Delta Society (MIND), a registered non-profit society since 1986. MIND is comprised of educators and parents who strive to promote excellence in Montessori education in Delta, B.C. All staff are qualified by the Ministry of Independent Schools or the B.C. College of Teachers in accordance with the Independent School Act of British Columbia.



Characteristics of Montessori Education at BBMH

- ♥ The child's inherent desire to learn and perfect his/her skills is nurtured by the stimulating and dynamic Montessori environment.
- ♥ The child develops a lifetime love of learning
- ♥ Each child works at his or her own pace and receives a high degree of individual attention.
- ♥ Student teacher ratios at BBMH are 10:1 in Preschool and 18:1 in Elementary.
- ♥ A well structured, prepared environment, with learning materials that are self-correcting.
- ♥ Respect for each other, the self and the environment are taught within a peace curriculum that is multi-cultural and non-denominational.
- ♥ With these opportunities, the child is empowered to fulfill his/her own potential thereby fostering
 - Independence
 - Self-discipline
 - Self-esteem
 - Self-motivation
